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Introduction

As 2026 begins, Astra Agro enters a new phase in its sustainability journey. With the 5-Year Action Plan (5YAP) concluded at the end of 2025, departmental targets now carry forward and strengthen ongoing initiatives to sustain momentum. Currently, we are in the process of evaluating the achievement of the 5YAP in collaboration with the independent third party, Peterson Solutions Indonesia.

Building on this framework, the Q1 2026 report highlights activities across rehabilitation programs and biodiversity disclosures, fire prevention, sustainable peatland management, responsible CPO and FFB sourcing, Orang Rimba programs, and CSR activities in Sulawesi. These efforts demonstrate how departments continue to uphold commitments while preparing the groundwork for the next stage of sustainability planning, consistently aligned with Astra Agro Lestari's Sustainability Policy.

Rehabilitation Program

As part of the Company's commitment to environmental protection and sustainability, in 2026, the Company set a rehabilitation program targeting 114.72 hectares of planting, equivalent to 14,500 trees. The Company continues to implement environmental improvement programs by collaborating with stakeholders, especially communities around its operational areas. Such involvement is expected to raise environmental awareness and ensure the long-term success of the planting efforts. The program focuses on three key ecosystems: riparian areas, mangrove areas, and other areas requiring ecological rehabilitation.

In this first quarter, rehabilitation activities have been carried out in seven subsidiaries with a total area of 12.69 hectares, equivalent to 1,904 trees. This realization consisted of rehabilitation in riparian areas covering 8.66 hectares (equivalent to 1,501 trees) and rehabilitation of other areas covering 4.03 hectares (equivalent to 403 trees). Planting was undertaken jointly by the Company's internal teams and local communities to assist with tree planting and maintenance.

The types of trees planted were adjusted to the site conditions and the availability of seedlings on site. The selection considered land suitability, plant adaptability, and planting objectives such as ecological functions. In Q1, a total of 25 tree species were planted, including rambutan (*Nephelium lappaceum*), angkana (*Pterocarpus indicus*), pulai (*Alstonia scholaris*), and gamal (*Gliricidia sepium*). These species were selected for their strong adaptability to local environmental conditions and their potential to enhance vegetation cover and provide food sources for wildlife.

Meanwhile, in Pasangkayu District, the Company and local mangrove community groups prepared 5,800 propagules for planting this year. The propagules were collected from the surrounding environment and nurtured in nurseries with careful monitoring until they were strong enough for field planting. This activity reflects the collaboration between the Company and local communities to support the preservation of coastal ecosystems, especially mangrove forests.

Biodiversity: Disclosure on Rehabilitation

As part of its commitment to biodiversity conservation, the Company continues to implement and evaluate the ecological impacts of ecosystem rehabilitation programs in its operational areas through biodiversity monitoring and key species identification. In Q 1, biodiversity monitoring was conducted at one of Astra Agro's subsidiaries in Pasangkayu, West Sulawesi, specifically in the mangrove rehabilitation area, which recorded a total of 26 wildlife species, comprising 24 bird species and two herpetofauna (reptile) species.

These records highlight that ecosystem rehabilitation plays a vital role in supporting biodiversity buffer habitats within operational areas. The presence of migratory birds in the mangrove rehabilitation area demonstrates its capacity to serve as both a resting ground and a food source. During this same period, an endemic Sulawesi species—the *pekaka bua bua* bird—was recorded in the mangrove rehabilitation area, reflecting its strong association with mangrove habitats.

The Company also targets that in 2026, all key species previously identified—namely primate groups (Proboscis Monkey, Kelawat Gibbon, and Boti Monkey) and hornbill groups (Rhinoceros Hornbill, Ivory Hornbill, Black Casqued Hornbill, White-bellied Hornbill, Black Hornbill, Black-crested Hornbill, and Golden Hornbill)—will continue to be preserved by safeguarding both their populations and habitats. To strengthen biodiversity conservation efforts in operational areas and enhance stakeholder engagement, monitoring activities will continue through collaboration with relevant stakeholders.

Fire Management System

Rainfall Monitoring

In the first quarter of 2026, Automatic Weather System (AWS) measurements, together with BMKG (www.bmkg.go.id) monitoring, confirmed that most regions of Indonesia were experiencing the rainy season, including Jambi, Central Kalimantan, East Kalimantan, South Kalimantan, West Sulawesi, and Central Sulawesi. Meanwhile, rainfall monitoring recorded that Riau and Aceh experienced a short dry season, with precipitation levels below 100 mm. Throughout this period, the Company conducted routine hotspot surveillance across concession areas, with no hotspots detected.

Fire Prevention

In Q1, the Company prioritized fulfilling and maintaining fire prevention equipment and infrastructure, including watchtowers, fire trucks, and water source maintenance. Monthly inspections and fire simulation were conducted to ensure facilities remained fully operational for emergency response during the dry season. This step also ensures that all subsidiaries comply with the standard set out in Minister of Agriculture Regulation No. 6 of 2025 on Land Clearing and Plantation Management Without Burning.

Furthermore, the Company also strengthened the readiness of its Emergency Preparedness and Response Team (TKTD) through training conducted with Manggala Agni Daops East Kalimantan. The program consisted of two stages, namely in-class training and field practice, aimed at improving TKTD's competence and agility in both direct and indirect fire suppression, according to established standards.

Training participants were expected to gain sufficient skills to support effective forest and land fire control, covering:

1. Fire Control Policy
2. Fundamental Fire Control Theory
3. Fire Prevention Strategies
4. Types and Usage of TKTD Facilities and Equipment
5. Fire Suppression Techniques
6. Practical Fire Suppression Exercises in Plantation Areas

43 firefighting personnel, specifically from East Kalimantan subsidiaries, attended the training, which strengthened their operational readiness for both direct and indirect fire suppression. All participants completed the program successfully, underscoring the Company's commitment to reinforcing preparedness and ensuring effective response to fire risks in the field.

Collaboration Program with Community Cares for Fire (MPA)

By the end of Q1 2026, the Company had established 124 MPA groups as part of efforts to expand forest and land fire (karhutla) prevention around its concession areas. Each group was regularly monitored and mentored to ensure program effectiveness and long-term sustainability in the field.

The Company continues to strengthen existing MPAs through targeted development programs. In this quarter, specifically in the Riau Region, two key initiatives were carried out with the Kuala Gasib Village MPA group, focusing on economic empowerment and joint patrols with local communities. On the economic front, the team launched a fire-free assistance program designed to support local livelihoods while encouraging active participation in fire prevention. As part of this effort, assistance to 15 members of the MPA group received catfish and pangasius fingerlings, creating a sustainable alternative source of income.

In parallel, the Company supported integrated patrols that brought together the Kuala Gasib Village MPA, local police, and village authorities. Together, they mapped fire-prone areas, identified access routes, and developed mitigation strategies. To reinforce these efforts, the team boosted community outreach by installing “no burning” banners and holding direct conversations with people living and working in fire-prone areas. These actions helped raise awareness and deepen the community’s understanding of how to prevent forest and land fires—and why it matters.

Extending the scope of MPA development, the Company coordinated with the Village Government, Police Sector (Kapolsek), Military Rayon Command (Koramil), and relevant agencies to prepare socialization, training, and the establishment of new MPA groups in West Sulawesi and Central Kalimantan. These activities are scheduled for the next quarter as part of the ongoing MPA development program, underscoring the Company’s commitment to expanding and sustaining fire prevention efforts across regions.

Monitoring in the Suppliers' Operation Area

Throughout Q1 2026, the Company maintained continuous monitoring of hotspots across FFB and CPO supply areas. Monitoring results confirmed that no warnings or indications of hotspots or fires were detected within operational areas.

Peatland Management

Research Progress

Entering 2026, Astra Agro, together with IPB University, continued its research on peatland emission measurement. The study has produced a first-year progress report, reinforcing the foundation for ongoing field monitoring. In Q1, the research team from IPB University, along with BRIN, conducted monitoring visits to assess field instruments and ensure their continued optimal performance. Looking ahead, planned activities include installing automated chambers to capture more accurate emission data, along with routine monthly measurements that will continue in subsequent quarters.

In addition, the research collaboration with Politeknik Negeri Banjarmasin (Poliban) has completed. This research collaboration tested the use of sensors and Internet of Things (IoT) to measure soil nutrients and predict oil palm production. The research results indicate that the sensors and IoT technology tested were capable of conducting measurements in the field; however, further field measurements of other parameters will be required in the future to predict oil palm production.

Sustainable Peat Management (SPM) through National Regulation Compliance

In accordance with the field verification conducted jointly with the Ministry of Environment (KLH) and reported in the previous quarter, one KHG in Riau has been revised and finalized at the 1:50,000 scale. Following up on the revised map, the Company adjusted peatland management practices and initiated implementation of the regulator-mandated Desa Mandiri Peduli Gambut (DMPG) program. The initial phase focuses on mapping potential 3R programs—Rewetting, Revegetation, and Economic Revitalization—targeted at communities surrounding the concession areas.

In addition, HGI has completed a comprehensive SPM evaluation report, following field assessments and desk studies conducted throughout 2025. The results showed a “Very Good” rating, which the Company used as evidence of its commitment to compliance with national regulations and consistency of management standards across peatland operational units.

Support for Smallholders on Plantation in Peatland

In Q1 2026, the Company undertook internal evaluations to assess the potential transition toward independent monitoring by partner smallholders around the concession area. The key activity this quarter centered on enriching the outcomes of smallholder assistance and gathering direct feedback from partners on their land management practices, following joint training and socialization with the Indonesian Peat Society (HGI). The program focus also shifted from the awareness-building phase through intensive training conducted throughout 2025 toward developing concrete implementation plans.

Responsible Sourcing

Traceability of CPO / PKO Supply Chain

Traceability to Mill

Throughout Q1 2026, the Company reaffirmed its achievement of full traceability across the entire supply chain, with 100% coverage for CPO and CPKO. This includes supplies from 56 CPO mills (21 internal and 35 external) and 6 CPKO mills. 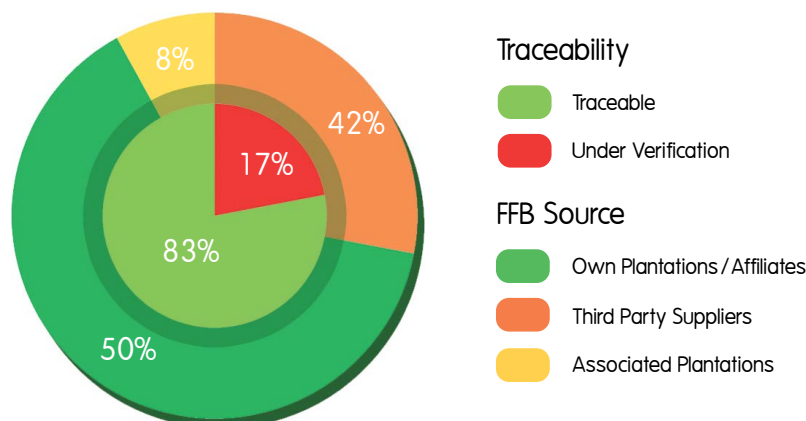

Traceability of FFB Sources from CPO Third-Party Suppliers

In Q1 2026, traceability of FFB supply sources in CPO reached 83%, with the remaining 17% under verification. Of the total FFB volumes, 50% originated from own plantations/affiliates, 8% from associated plantations, and 42% from third-party suppliers. Among the 35 external mills, 21 have achieved full traceability of their FFB supply sources, while the remainder are still in the process of completing supplier mapping and data collection down to the smallholder level. Regular supplier engagement, therefore, remains a key focus of our approach, with continued emphasis on strengthening traceability to smallholders and supporting newly onboarded suppliers in meeting traceability requirements. These efforts reflect our ongoing commitment to building a more inclusive and transparent supply chain.

Support Program to CPO Suppliers

Aligning Suppliers with AAL's Sustainability Assessment Mechanism

In Q1 2026, we continued the implementation of the SAT assessment across our supplier base, focusing on onboarding newly engaged suppliers into the SAT framework and facilitating annual data updates for existing suppliers. The average SAT score remained at 85%, consistent with Q4 2025, largely due to the onboarding of new suppliers during this period. The process included follow-up on assessment submissions, review of supporting evidence, and updates to supplier sustainability information and documentation.

Verification activities are being prioritized for suppliers with consistent supply relationships and significant transaction volumes, as part of a risk-based approach to supplier sustainability monitoring. These activities support the maintenance of reliable and up-to-date supplier sustainability data, while progressively strengthening supplier assessment coverage across the supply chain.

Potential Supplier Violations

During January–March 2026, no violations were identified among our direct suppliers, reaffirming the effectiveness of our monitoring process. Further information on our grievance procedure and the list of reported cases is available [here](#).

FFB Sourcing & Smallholders Support

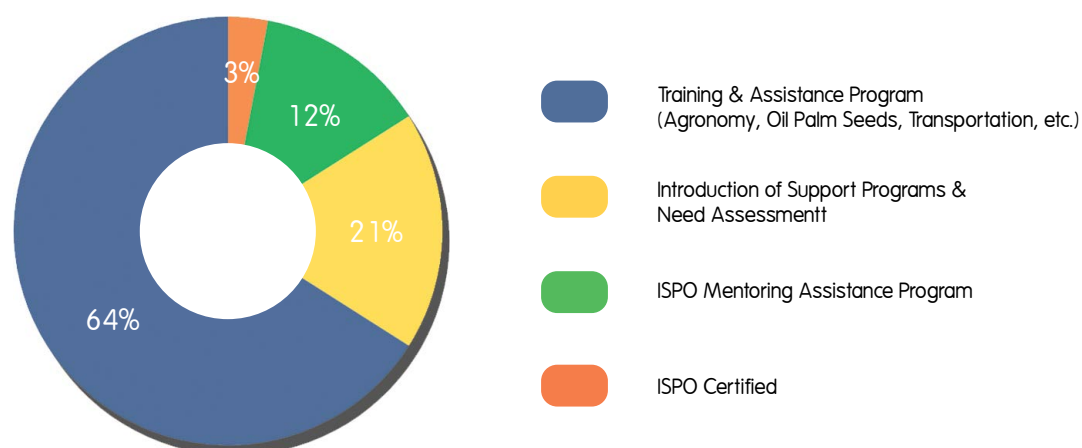
Traceability of FFB Supply

From January to March 2026, the Company reaffirmed its commitment to maintaining full traceability across all FFB sources. Supply volumes comprised 49% from own plantations, 4% from associated plantations, and 47% from independent suppliers. This underscores the Company's consistency in upholding supply chain transparency and accountability at the start of 2026. Traceability reports for each mill can be accessed [\[here\]](#).

Support Program for FFB Suppliers

In Q1 2026, the Company continued transactions with 385 active network partners, connected to approximately ±15,700 plasma smallholders and ±24,600 traceable independent smallholders. This collaboration remains focused on enhancing smallholder productivity while adhering to AAL's Sustainability Policy. By the end of Q1, purchases from smallholders reached around 678,703 tons of FFB, equivalent to more than IDR 2 trillion. The following provides an overview of the Company's support progress from 2019 to Q1 2026.

Support Program for Independent Smallholders

a. Training and Capacity Building

During this period, field teams concentrated on strengthening internal capacity through competency-based training and brevet programs. Thus, training and capacity building activities for independent smallholders are scheduled to be carried out in the following quarter.

b. Facilitating Partnership Support Program

The Company continues to strengthen its operational support for network partners by providing access to various strategic resources that support sustainable oil palm cultivation practices. These efforts are part of the Company's commitment to building productive, sustainable, and mutually beneficial partnerships.

In Q1 2026, the Company stepped up its partnership support program through several key initiatives, including roadshows to network partners and leveraging WhatsApp to promote the program. Specifically targeting 98 loyal partners across AAL's operational areas, the initiative aims to improve communication, boost engagement, and ensure more responsive service.

Essentially, this support program is designed to ensure a stable and consistent supply of Fresh Fruit Bunches (FFB) to the Company's mills by strengthening partner loyalty. To achieve this, the Company provides practical solutions tailored to partners' needs, including access to capital, fertilizers, herbicides, and operational units. Among these various initiatives, capital assistance and the same-day (H+1) payment acceleration scheme represent significant breakthroughs. By accelerating payments, this program directly improves the daily cash flow of partner smallholders, thereby creating a more sustainable and prosperous supply chain for all parties involved.

Orang Rimba Programs

Ensuring Food Security

Stepping into 2026, Astra Agro distributed 3.58 tons of rice and 331 food packages to the Orang Rimba community. This achievement reflects the tangible outcome of multi-stakeholder collaboration involving village governments, *ketemengungan* leaders, and strategic partners.

Access to Education

At the beginning of 2026, the Education Program for the Orang Rimba broadened its reach across all levels, from early childhood (PAUD) to higher education. Despite this progress, dropout rates remain high at the elementary and secondary levels, as many children accompany their parents to work in the forest. To sustain learning motivation, the Company supports non-formal education through Community Learning Centers (PKBM). Through Package A, B, and C programs, children can continue their studies, sit for examinations even while residing in the forest, and ultimately obtain formal diplomas.

During Q1, educational activities across all levels—from early childhood (PAUD) to senior high school—were centered on the implementation of the Pancasila Student Profile Strengthening Project (P5). This initiative fostered character development, independence, and a sense of cooperation among students. The quarter was further enriched by the Ramadhan pesantren program, which strengthened children's spiritual values alongside their academic and extracurricular pursuits.

The highlight of Q1 was marked by the National Student Sports Olympiad (O2SN) for elementary schools in Air Hitam District, held in Jernih Village and SDN 52 Semurung. In this prestigious competition, 16 schools delegated their students to compete in five main sports branches: pencak silat, swimming, athletics, floor gymnastics, and badminton. Among the standout performances was Rendi, a student from the Temenggung Nangkus group enrolled in the remote class of SDN 191 Pematang Kabau, who impressed both judges and spectators. His remarkable victory in swimming, earning a Gold Medal, demonstrated that geographic constraints are no barrier to achievement. This success reflected not chance, but the result of strong dedication and disciplined training supervised by his teacher. His journey showcased extraordinary resilience and adaptability.

These initial achievements of 2026 provided a positive reflection for education in Air Hitam. By integrating character development through the P5, spiritual enrichment via Ramadan pesantren, and sporting achievements through O2SN, an inclusive learning ecosystem has been established. Rendi's victory stands as a symbol of hope that every child, regardless of origin, is capable of achieving success and contributing pride to their school and community.

Higher Education

In Q1, two female students currently pursuing higher education, Desi and Kurnia, were engaged in semester assessments and practical examinations. Kurnia concentrated on her internship evaluation at the Pematang Kabau Air Hitam Community Health Center, while Desi undertook a civil law project as part of her coursework.

On the other hand, following Bejujung and Besar's decision to pursue independence at the end of 2025, the Company adopted a supportive monitoring role in Q1 2026 as part of its sustainability commitment. Efforts were directed toward light collaboration opportunities that respected their responsibilities as heads of households. The hope is that alumni such as Bejujung and Besar will continue to serve as catalysts for sustainable cultivation, strengthening the Orang Rimba community's confidence and independence in agriculture.

The success of the community empowerment program is measured not only in numbers but in tangible life transformations. Beyond alumni independence in the community, Fauzan's journey—a son of the Orang Rimba community now embarking on a professional career—serves as proof of the Company's commitment to supporting diverse pathways for local talent development.

This alumnus of Polbangtan Bogor now carries the responsibility as Plantation Assistant in one of Astra Agro's estate units in Kalimantan. In Q1 2026, he transitioned from classroom learning to direct leadership in the field, specifically at Afdeling OE. As a young leader, he oversees productivity and coordination across plantation blocks, supervising 26 harvest workers and three harvesting supervisors. The role requires decisiveness, precision, and strong communication skills.

'The challenges and obstacles I face now are important moments to sharpen my leadership skills,' Fauzan said. In the field, he encounters diverse dynamics, ranging from cultivation techniques to human resource management. Although he must adapt to the disciplined and dynamic plantation environment, Fauzan proves that background is no barrier to professional success. His graduation from Polbangtan and successful transition into a managerial role mark a significant milestone in his career and provide tangible proof that, with education and opportunity, sons of indigenous communities such as Orang Rimba can compete and lead in strategic industries. His dedication to Afdeling OE serves as an inspiration to his peers and offers hope for his community of origin. The Company continues to support Fauzan and other young talents, ensuring equal opportunities for growth, contribution, and national pride.

Healthcare Support

Routine health support for the Orang Rimba community is delivered through Posyandu services, supplementary feeding (PMT) distributions, and mobile health outreach via the Puskesmas Keliling (Pusling). These initiatives ensure consistent health monitoring and safeguard vulnerable groups by providing additional nutrition and essential services, especially for those with limited mobility or access to health facilities.

During Q1 2026, PMT was distributed to 11 pregnant women, 10 infants, 104 toddlers, 205 school-age children, 60 adolescents, 164 adults, and 28 elderly. The number of beneficiaries in this period increased compared to the end of last year, reflecting updated target data and routine verification by health officers. Program delivery was also aligned with the Integrated Primary Care (ILP) system, extending coverage beyond mothers and toddlers to all life-cycle groups. Through ILP, communities gain regular access to services, standardized examination flows, and more comprehensive health monitoring.

In addition to routine examinations, the Company facilitated health education covering nutrition, maternal and child health, clean and healthy living practices, and parental roles in safeguarding family well-being. These socializations were integrated into Posyandu and field visits, ensuring that communities received not only physical services but also gained better knowledge on disease prevention and nutrition.

Community health was further strengthened through the Puskesmas Keliling (Pusling) program, a collaboration between the Company and Puskesmas Pematang Kabau. This mobile outreach ensured that remote communities continued to access examinations, basic treatment, medical consultations, and health education. In Q1, each Posyandu and Pusling visit was accompanied by a routine recording of weight, height, immunization status, pregnant women's condition, and other health notes. These records revealed conditions requiring follow-up, including prevalent respiratory infections (ISPA) among certain Orang Rimba groups. This data serves as the basis for health workers and community facilitators to determine subsequent interventions, so that services are more precise and effective.

Agriculture Learning Center (ALC)

ID Cards Acceleration

The program to assist the Orang Rimba community in accessing civil registration services continues as part of the Company's efforts to strengthen the community's access to legal identity documents. In this quarter, no additional ID cards were issued, as the administrative process is still in the stages of data verification, document validation, and ongoing coordination with the Population and Civil Registration Office (Dukcapil). At present, the program covers 898 people, consistent with figures recorded in the previous quarter.

Building on this progress, the Company will continue its assistance throughout 2026 to reinforce the community's possession of official identity cards. Through these efforts, it is expected that the issuance of ID cards will reach approximately 30 individuals by the end of the year, thereby enabling more members of the Orang Rimba community to obtain legal identity.

Suluh Rimbo Sikar & Suluh Rimbo Air Panas

During January–March 2026, agricultural activities in Suluh Rimbo Sikar and Suluh Rimbo Air Panas continued with cultivation cycles that reflected sustainability through staggered planting and harvesting. At the start of the quarter, the groups prioritized long beans, peanuts, and chili, with harvests scheduled progressively through to the end of March. The Company set a target of one main harvest for these commodities. By the end of March, Suluh Rimbo Sikar had successfully harvested 150 kg of long beans, while Suluh Rimbo Air Panas remained in the crop maintenance stage, with plants still in their growth phase.

The cultivation of multiple commodities formed part of the diversification strategy, reducing reliance on a single crop and mitigating risks from pests, weather variability, and yield fluctuations. This approach provides the groups with more stable sources of production.

In addition to cultivation and harvesting activities, the Company continued to deliver routine technical assistance, covering crop care before, during, and after harvest, land maintenance, weed control, pest handling, and post-harvest practices. These efforts aim to safeguard crop quality while strengthening members' capacity to manage farmland independently.

Overall, Q1 results demonstrate that both groups successfully sustained planting and harvesting cycles effectively. The harvest of long beans, peanuts, and chili confirms that the ALC program remains productive and continues to provide practical agricultural learning opportunities for the Orang Rimba community.

Social Development Partnership Forum of Orang Rimba (FKPS-SAD)

In Q1 2026, FKPS-SAD strengthening focused on advancing the outcomes of multi-stakeholder coordination established in the prior period. Building on the Q4 2025 agreement to develop a Grand Design for restoring the Orang Rimba's livelihoods, the collaborative process in early 2026 moved into a more technical stage, involving issue analysis, refinement of priority needs, and drafting recommendations for collaboration.

As part of the forum's follow-up, the Company actively supported the dissemination of meeting outcomes to assisted communities, facilitated continued local dialogue, and provided technical input, particularly on strengthening livelihoods, improving access to basic services, and addressing social needs. This approach ensured that provincial-level discussions progressed beyond the forum and began to translate into actions relevant to on-the-ground conditions.

The involvement of the Orang Rimba community was also reinforced at each stage of dialogue, ensuring that their needs and aspirations were not only considered but also formed the foundation for planning future collaborative programs. Thus, in Q1 2026, FKPS-SAD evolved from merely a consolidation platform toward the formulation of concrete and implementable steps for restoring Orang Rimba's sources of livelihood.

Meriau Assistance

In Q1 2026, support for the Meriau Group remained focused on sustaining the economic pillar through monitoring and maintenance of productive land established in the previous period. Building on the Q4 2025 consolidation process, the Company provided regular guidance for a three-hectare plot collectively managed by 16 members of the Beharop Maju Farmers Group in Temenggung Nggrip's area.

During this period, efforts centered on monitoring the condition of young jengkol trees and other supporting crops, observing growth development, and ensuring that basic technical needs in land management continued to be met. By the end of Q1, the cultivated crops showed good growth conditions, although they remained in the maintenance phase and had not yet entered the production stage.

Alongside technical monitoring, the Company also worked to strengthen the group's internal coordination in managing shared farmland. Throughout January–March 2026, the 16 families demonstrated a more structured division of roles in land maintenance, cleaning, and crop supervision. This development indicates that collective management has become more organized compared to the program's initial stages. In this process, the Company maintained its role as facilitator through field observation, routine monitoring, and light technical support on crop care and land upkeep, ensuring the continuity of the family farm as a source of food security and long-term economic potential.

Overall, Meriau's assistance activities in Q1 2026 still showed positive program continuity since Q4 2025. The consistency of land maintenance and active member involvement has become an important foundation for program development in subsequent periods.

COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM IN SULAWESI AREA

The Company's Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) program is implemented using a participatory approach through dialogue with local communities to identify their needs, expectations, and local potential. Through this open dialogue, the Company not only gathers relevant input but also fosters a sense of ownership and trust among the communities. In the Sulawesi region, this commitment is routinely implemented every quarter across three subsidiaries: PT Lestari Tani Teladan (PT LTT), PT Mamuang (PT MMG), and PT Agro Nusa Abadi (PT ANA). The focus of these activities includes economic empowerment, improving the quality of education and healthcare, as well as environmental conservation and the improvement of supporting infrastructure. In doing so, the Company and the community can support one another, while allowing the community to experience tangible and sustainable benefits from the Company's presence.

Community Empowerment Program at PT Lestari Tani Teladan (PT LTT)

PT LTT continues to fulfill its CSR commitment through social and economic empowerment programs designed to address community needs, improve well-being, and strengthen sustainable relationships with the surrounding community. The program is implemented in a participatory manner, involving the community as the primary agents of development. Operating in Donggala Regency, Central Sulawesi, PT LTT consistently fulfills its social responsibilities with a focus on two Zone One Villages, Towiora and Tinauka. The following are the CSR programs implemented in Q 1.

In Towiora Village, which is located relatively far from the central market, the program delivered direct benefits with the participation of 143 households.

In addition to the Ramadan Safari, PT LTT also consistently supports other religious activities, such as the commemoration of Isra' Mi'raj, by holding competitions among Islamic boarding school students.

Community Empowerment Initiatives: Perempuan Maju Jaya Women's Group and Rio Mukti Bumdes

Formed on May 18, 2025, in Rio Mukti Village, the Perempuan Maju Jaya Women's Group, comprising 24 members, aims to strengthen household economic capacity through livestock-based enterprises and the utilization of local resources. With management led by Nengah Wantri (Chairperson), Ni Kadek Novitasari (Secretary), and Ni Kadek Asriati (Treasurer), the group actively holds regular meetings, business discussions, and mentoring together with the local civil society organization, ROA (Relawan untuk Orang dan Alam), and the Rio Mukti Village Government, focusing on pig farming, poultry, and household yard utilization.

As part of its commitment to community empowerment, PT MMG distributed business capital assistance to the Perempuan Maju Jaya Group on March 11, 2026. The assistance included 30 piglets, starter feed and vitamins, pen repairs, and technical training in livestock management. The handover was carried out by PT MMG Administrator, Riki Agusrialdy, witnessed by the village government, ROA, and group members. This support is expected to boost household economic growth while reinforcing the role of women in village development.

In addition, the Rio Mukti Jaya Group, which is a community group in Rio Mukti Village, Rio Pakava District, Donggala Regency, has more than 15 members and a well-defined organizational structure. Led by Saing (Chairman), Ade Suparman (Secretary), and Neli Agustin (Treasurer), the group was established to develop fish farming using biofloc technology, recognized as more efficient, environmentally friendly, and productive than conventional methods. PT MMG supported the development of this group through the distribution of 5,000 tilapia fingerlings as business capital assistance, accompanied by ongoing mentoring. This support enabled the group to optimize four previously prepared biofloc ponds, positioning them as a model for sustainable aquaculture in the village.

Safari Ramadan Program

To strengthen community ties and build positive relations with Zone One Village communities, PT MMG carried out the Safari Ramadan across several mosques near its operations. The activity reflects the Company's commitment to fostering harmonious relations with village stakeholders while reinforcing the spirit of togetherness during the holy month of Ramadan. The series of Safari Ramadhan events was filled with visits by PT MMG management and staff to Zone One Villages' mosques, where the Company, together with the community, held breaking of the fast and congregational worship, creating a warm and meaningful atmosphere of togetherness. The commitment was further demonstrated through the provision of support, including prayer carpets, fans, and sound systems for the mosques visited. It is hoped that this can increase the comfort of worshippers in performing religious activities and strengthen the role of mosques as centers of religious and social activities in the village.

Community Development Program at PT Agro Nusa Abadi

PT ANA has consistently demonstrated a strong commitment to implementing CSR programs that provide tangible and sustainable benefits to the communities surrounding its operational areas. The program, which covers seven villages in East Petasia District—Pebooa, Towara Pantai, Towara, Molino, Bungintimbe, Tompira, and Bunta—is implemented and designed to address community needs across various sectors, including social, economic, educational, religious, and local cultural preservation. In its implementation, PT ANA applies a participatory approach through village deliberation forums and joint discussions with community leaders, traditional leaders, religious leaders, and representatives of other community groups. Active community involvement fosters a sense of ownership while ensuring the sustainability of the program and strengthening harmonious relations between the Company and the villages.

Enhancing Education Programs

In Q1, PT ANA's education CSR program focused on supporting honorary teachers in village-fostered schools. This step serves both as an appreciation and as a driver for improving education quality through the provision of incentives for honorary teachers. Healthcare Support

Income Generating Activities

In 2026, PT ANA reaffirmed its commitment to supporting local economic development through MSME mentoring programs, including the Sinergi Magasi MSME in Molino Village. At present, Sinergi Magasi has expanded beyond sago-based food products to pilot a new dishwashing soap business in Molino Village, with plans to expand sales across neighboring villages. Within this framework, Sinergi Magasi has been nominated to join Astra International's *UMKM Bisa* program, through which it will receive professional training to further enhance its capacity and business sustainability.

Additionally, PT ANA carried out mentoring for the laying hen farming group in Pebooa Village. In Q1, the mentoring focused on feed management and production handling. This program is expected to improve productivity and the quality of livestock products, thereby directly impacting the welfare of the local community. Overall, the synergy between PT ANA and the village community through these programs strengthens a more independent and sustainable business ecosystem within the Company's Zone One area.

Food Staple Package Distribution Activity

Ahead of Eid al-Fitr 2026, PT ANA distributed staple food packages to households in the Company's Zone One area. This social assistance program was a manifestation of the Company's care and responsibility in supporting community welfare, especially to meet basic needs ahead of the religious holiday. A total of 235 households across seven villages received packages of daily essentials. Distribution was coordinated with local village authorities to ensure fair and accurate delivery. Through this activity, PT ANA sought to ease the burden of the community while also strengthening harmonious relations with the surrounding environment, as part of its ongoing commitment to delivering positive contributions in its operational areas.

Environmental Stewardship

During this period, PT ANA carried out an environmental program through the "Spirit of Reduce Plastic Waste" campaign in Zone One Villages. This activity was realized by distributing 235 non-plastic shopping bags as an effort to reduce single-use plastics. The initiative also included educational and awareness sessions on household waste management, encouraging community members to properly manage it and turn it into useful, value-added products. Through this initiative, the Company hopes to encourage the community to reduce plastics and adopt more sustainable waste management practices.

The Pebooa Village Government expressed appreciation for PT ANA's prompt support in responding to and mitigating community land fires. Together, these programs aimed to improve community preparedness in facing potential fire incidents while promoting environmentally responsible behavior.

Thus, PT ANA not only contributes to environmental preservation but also affirms its commitment to supporting the safety and welfare of communities around the Company's operational areas.
